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## CASE STATEMENT

Disability is relentless. So is hope.

This is the message Luke 14 Exchange has been sharing since 2019. People with disabilities are largely absent from society, including the church, and many are not using their God-given gifts. In Luke chapter 14, God tells his followers to go out and find people with disabilities and compel them to come to God's eternal banquet table.

Hope is the antidote to the high rates of homelessness, joblessness, divorce, abuse, and suicide among people with disabilities. They are also among the least evangelized. (Joni Eareckson Tada). According to the World Health Organization (WHO), 15% of the world's population has disabilities. This represents 61 million adults in the United States.

In the parable of the banquet in Luke 14, we learn God isn't satisfied with a partially full banquet table. Hope compels us to bring people affected by disability to the table.

#### Mission:

We coach Christian communities, mentor people affected by disability, and encourage their families until God's table is full.

#### Vision:

- Relationship: To exchange a life without God for a relationship with God through Jesus Christ.
- Community: To exchange a life of isolation for a life in community.
- Purpose: To exchange a life of low expectation for an abundant life with purpose.

#### We will accomplish this by:


- Mentoring individuals with a disability.
- Facilitating Page 42, a writers' critique group designed specifically for Christian writers with disabilities.
- Strengthening marriages affected by disability.
- Encouraging and pointing to resources.
- Serving in camps for families affected by disabilities.
- Speaking at conferences and on podcasts related to disability.

## **Programs**

#### **MENTORING**

Receiving constructive feedback is very difficult when one has a disability. There is a sense among many who know someone with a disability to sugar-coat or even avoid telling the truth, in the name of compassion. They think the person already has enough to deal with and is probably doing the best they can. But we all need accurate feedback to grow into who God created us to be.

In 2023, we led 75 mentoring sessions with 19 different individuals. In 2024, we hope to add a group mentoring opportunity that is currently in the beta testing phase.



To mentor one person for one-hour, the cost is \$180. This covers intake, preparation for the meeting, and follow-up.

Jerry has the same disability I do, which makes it easier to talk to him because he gets it. We talk every other week.

He is one of the few mentors I have who makes sure he understands every word before answering.

#### **PAGE 42**

Page 42 is a monthly virtual critique group for fledgling Christian writers with disabilities. The group's goal is to help people with disabilities share the message God has given them and to provide a community to support them in those efforts. The group provides mentoring to members to enhance their communication skills in writing. We are excited to partner with Word Weavers International to help people with disabilities share the words God gives them.

We've been facilitating Page 42 since November 2021.

Members pay a nominal fee to Word Weavers. Because of the additional support offered to this group, it costs our staff \$7,200 for a year for up to 6 people. It costs \$600 to plan for, facilitate, and follow-up one monthly meeting.

Page 42 helped remind me I am never alone. Through hearing the stories of others who share similar experiences, I was both inspired and deeply resonated with the other members of the group. Page 42 showed me we all have a voice and we all have a story.

#### **MARRIAGE SUPPORT**

Marriage is hard. Living with disability is hard. Whether disability was known before the wedding, or blindsided the couple later in life, there are extra challenges for couples to live a biblical marriage model. And each couple's experiences are different. Few pastoral or professional counselors understand these dynamics.

Joan Borton authored *MarriageAbility: Embracing the Richness of a Marriage Affected by Disability.* This book shares examples from the Bortons and

couples across the nation who live with disability in their marriage. These stories, woven together with biblical marriage principles, help the reader strengthen and grow their relationship. Each chapter ends with questions for the couple to consider together. Also included are tips for the friend or church who want to come alongside in support and encouragement.

MarriageAbility released in late 2023. We are continuing to find families who would benefit from the book, and we are looking for opportunities to share the book with an even wider audience.

It costs \$19.13 for one book to be gifted and mailed to a family or church. It will cost about \$3,000 to produce an audio version of the book.

"As a Director of Disabilities Ministry in my church, I am always on the lookout for useful resources for our families. This is a book that will be so helpful for couples deciding if marriage is for them when disability is involved, as well as a great reminder to those who are already married. Joan writes with humor and shares honestly the joys and struggles of marriage and caregiving. This is definitely a book to include in a Disability Ministry's basic library."

#### **ENCOURAGING AND POINTING TO RESOURCES**

Many times, families and people with disabilities don't know where to go to get the resources they need. Sometimes that resource is a listening ear. Other times, it's a connection to an organization or person who can speak to that need. We have over 40 years of experience in disability ministry and an extensive nationwide network from which to draw.

In 2023, we provided 28 referrals. We've already made 20 in the first three months of this year.

The cost for the right referral, listening ear, or someone to pray with them is priceless!

#### **CAMPING FOR FAMILIES AFFECTED BY DISABILITY**

Luke 14 Exchange partners with two ministries who host summer camp for the entire family affected by disability. Some of those who attend refer to these weeks as "a pocket of Heaven," or "coming home," or "a big family reunion." Camp is a place where families feel safe and know they are not alone.

Our focus is to use our years of experience to provide counsel, support, community, and accurate, applicable Bible teaching.

Our two camp partners raise scholarship money to help cover the costs for the families to attend, and cover all the programming costs. There is very little left to bring in speakers or a resource team with our experience.

Each summer, we minister to approximately 70 families at two camps.

The cost for Luke 14 Exchange to take part in each week of camp is \$12,625. This includes time, travel, registration, preparation, follow-up and leadership meetings.

- \$230 allows us to minister to the spiritual needs of one family affected by disability at camp.
- \$902 pays for one day of our ministry at camp.
- \$90 pays for one-hour of our ministry at camp.

## Programs.

#### **SPEAKING**

Jerry and Joan speak at Christian and secular conferences and podcasts on the topics of disability, marriage, and leadership. Many of these conferences cannot afford to pay for speaking fees or travel expenses. We believe that speaking and taking part in these conferences allows us to influence a wider audience. Some of our topics include:

In 2023, we had 23 speaking opportunities. In the first quarter of 2024, we've booked 14 opportunities. Our cost ranges from \$60 - \$2,000.
